

Rice Northwest Museum of Rocks and Minerals, Hillsboro, Oregon

If you get up to Portland, try to stop in at the Rice Museum. Founded by Richard and Helen Rice in 1996 to pass on the pleasure and knowledge of the beautiful wonders of nature, it now houses one of the most extensive collection of rocks, minerals and reference materials in the United States. The museum itself was the residence of the Rice's and is on the National Historic Registry, with extraordinary woodwork of native Oregon Wood and unique architectural makes for a beautiful place to visit. Add to that an "Alma Rose" Rhodochrosite from the Sweet Home

Mine in Colorado, a large meteorite collection, dinosaur fossils, gold and the largest opalfilled thunderegg in the world.

Rice Museum also has classes, annual sales, group tours and is available for rental for your special event. A large collection like this can also bring some trouble, recently the janitor helped him self to several pieces of large gold and was in the process of shipping it to a store in NY when his friends turned him in. Jeffrey Harvey, the grandson of Bill and Sharleen Har-

vey who donated a large portion of the gold to the museum, was arrested and the gold, one piece a 42 once nugget worth \$50,000, was returned. So take a trip to visit the Rice Museum, just don't steal the gold!





Fort Cook Museum by Barbara Roufs-Massey

Bob an I visited the Fort Crook Museum in Fall River Mills, California on June 12, 2010. It was an incredible experience. The Museum is located on Highway 299 & Ft. Crook Avenue. Very distinguishable by a huge Round Barn that has been restructured from on old one from Little Valley,

near Pittville, California. There are eight buildings including the main Bldg, Log Cabin, Pony Barn, Pittville Schoolhouse, Farm Equipment Bldg., James Showcase, Machinery Bldg. and Blacksmith Shop, and Fall River Mills Jail. They are all done in great taste and care and the exhibits are very interesting, especially the history of the Northern California area. There is no charge for viewing and rest rooms. Only 2 and one half hours from Klamath Falls it is well worth the trip. It is quite interesting about the Pit Indians Heritage and the artifacts. We recommend a visit wholeheartedly!

Crater Rock Museum

Central Point, Oregon

I went to middle school at Scenic Middle School across the street from the rock museum, a small cinder block building that was dark and slightly smelly. I would volunteer for an hour a week for extra credit for my science class and enjoyed the trickle of visitors who enjoyed the museum for free. That was 1990 and everything changes, especially the Crater Rock Museum. I was amazed by the large building, the expansive gift

shop and impressive

displays, being just the start of the changes.

Founded in 1954 by Frieda and Delmar Smith the museum was entrusted to the Roxy Ann Gem & Mineral Club and it was the passing of a member that left the funds and collection to build the new building that will not be finished until later this year when they will have a grand re-opening to celebrate the completion of the museum.

The gift shop is well or-

ganized and features items made by members as well as tourist items. The main exhibit space is extremely well lit, organized and marked. It features rotational exhibits and permanent displays with finished and rough rock and artisan works. From there you go into some smaller spaces with Indian artifacts, fossils and a dinosaur exhibit any kid would love. Also in

the museum is a large library, a meeting room and a media room which can be

rented out and where they hold their monthly meetings. Finally if you are a

member you can use their well equipped work shop, where several members were working on projects on the day of my visit. Here you

can even rent a locker space to store you rock and supplies for your projects, and they offer classes for both members and non members. It is well worth the trip to see the space and drool at the exhibits and you might consider a membership to Roxy Ann if you are not a member currently for access to their shop and library.
