June Birth Stone—Alexandrite

- True alexandrite is a very rare and expensive stone mainly from Russia with some coming from Brazil
- * A hardness of 8.5, the more distinct the color the more value
- * Mysterious color change of blueish green in daylight and purpleish red in artificial light with no brown or grey
- * Said to be a stone of good omen and will inspire creativity, imagination and intuition.
- Is a chrysoberyl that also contains iron, titanium and chromium



- Now commonly made synthetically for jewelry, synthetic alexandrite is more popular for lasers mainly used for removing hair, tattoos, leg veins & kidney stones
- * The alexandrite laser was originally designed to be a fixed wavelength laser but now is a tuneable solid state laser with rods from .3 to .7cm in diameter and 7.6 to 10cm long and can be pulsed or continuous.



STORAGE TRAILER ~ ROCK HOARDING

We think we've worked out the logistics on the storage trailer and most think it's a good idea, we will vote at the next meeting so if you have an objection please let us know quickly!

The May Rock & Gem Magazine feature an editorial on a carnelian area that had been closed to rock collecting due to abuse. It went on to ask how to we protect sites from "abusive collectors" and rock hoarders. I must say I've never given much thought on the idea but can see where it could be a major problem. I look at my collection from Grandpa that I'm trying to get rid of and think, wow a lot of rock. Sure it was over 50 years but did he really need that much? Could he have left some behind for others? As regulations become more restrictive we must be aware of our actions and the consequences of future rock hounds. I would have said you can never have too much rock, but now maybe I'll take a moment to ask do I really need all of this as I pack up from my next field trip. I also believe that rock hounds are excellent stewards of the land, but others can be so careless, so take a moment and clean up not only your mess but maybe someone else's. The June Rock & Gem reprinted the *AFMS Code of Ethics*, I've hadn't read it in a while and as I took the time to reread it, I thought I would also include it for you to look over once again. If we don't take the steps to protect our collection sites, we might not have any left!

- I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land with
 I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will
 - I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- I will leave all gates as found.

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- I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extin-
- I will discard no burning material matches, cigarettes, etc.
- I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
 - I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
 - I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably
- I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and
 - I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collect-
 - I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes. I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner






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Sunstone Trip - May 30 By Linda & Robert Gresham

Sunstone Field Trip

June 26th & 27th

Plush, Oregon

This field trip is to the club's claims northeast of Lakeview, approximately 170 miles from Klamath Falls. Sunstones are the Oregon state gem and one of the more easier rocking so children are welcome and may enjoy themselves. The Sunstones can be picked up on the ground or if you prefer can be hard rock mined in the pit. For picking up the stones you might want to bring a small rake, shovel a screen (quarter inch and/or half inch), and a bag or bucket to put the sunstones in. Sunstones on the surface can be collected without tools. Just bring a bag or bucket to put them in. Hard rock mining in the pit needs a lot of muscle and fortitude not to mention hammers and pry bars, if you want to work hard.

There is no bathroom in the area so arrangements to have a porta-potty or other facility on site needs to be made. There are no trees, sagebrush being the only vegetation, so bring your own shade, chairs and lots of water and food! A Potluck dinner may be scheduled. Make sure that you have good tires on your vehicle to deal with the rough area.

Garwin Carlson is our leader and he will be there on Friday, he will be happy to show you the boundaries of the claim and how to mine for sunstones. Please feel free to call him with questions at 541-882-8276.

Maps are included but make sure you watch for yellow arrows, one on the main road and then others into the claim area (don't go beyond the yellow arrow on the main road). We have also included an area map and a close up map to help guide you.

Feel free to come up for a day or for the weekend, you'll be glad you did!
