Your Display Case Suggestions and Ideas

Last January, Marshall Curran did a wonderful program on putting together your display for the show which I expanded on a little bit in the February newsletter. I would like to go a little more in depth about creating a display case to help you as you start to plan your case for our show. Our theme is crystals, leaving the realm of possibilities wide open. Remember you don't have to feature crystals, make your case personal to you. Here is a recap from our last news article about cases:

- * Employ contrast for your background and display material
- * Use foam, wood, boxes etc under your display material to give your rocks height and add visual appeal
- Consider quantity and groupings
- * Keep it simple
- * Play with color and have fun

When looking at display cases at both our show and other shows I would say that we have one of the most outstanding displays of cases that I've ever seen. I've been to shows that have had only 4 or 5 cases total and each year we have more and more. Last year was our largest number of entries yet and we built even more cases ,thanks to Marshall and Kermit, and filled those also. If you are thinking of entering do not delay in putting in your application and don't be intimidated, it is easy and fun. When looking at cases at our and others shows there seems to be four types of display cases, consider one of these types when creating your own.

The Educational:

The educational display teaches the guests information about what is inside your case. Whether you are telling a story about your collection, how you collected it or just naming each piece so the public can learn about them; take the time to make sure that your writing is clear, concise, legible and large enough to be seen. Maps, pictures and diagrams can help you emphasis your collection and offer even more insight.





Cases

The Collections:

Our cases are the pride and joy of our members, showing off what you collect is the essence of these cases. Showcasing the sweat equity that it takes to collect your rock and turn it into a work of art or focusing on something about rocks that you love there are several ways that can enhance your case. Try and use different materials like foam, risers or stands to lift your collection to different heights to help show it off. Fabric material of different color or type along with various groupings also help to emphasis different aspects of the collection. The background and sides of your case also create a visual medium so be careful what you choose to put behind your collection so it isn't to busy or overwhelming. Take a moment to get down and look in your case not just down at it, remember a lot of our guests are children who are looking up into your case and the impact that you are trying to create may be lost if they are looking up. Many collections are not theme or even rock related so a little sign letting your audience know what your collection is helps. One member brought his collection of Japanese art which was beautiful and another put in their favorite jewelry so it doesn't have to be something you created yourself.

The Selling:

Sometimes the cases are being put in by dealers or other organizations so they may being using the case to create advertising for their products, not just showing off rocks. If you are a artist, beader, chainmail or wire wrapper and a member and want to include info on your self, your website or store please remember to keep it rock related and thoughtful. These can be visually enjoyable for our guests while bring in new business for yourself. Make sure you keep a good ratio of information, product, education and selling information to keep your display balanced. We've seen cases that have only 1 or 2 items in it with a brochure that makes it look empty and thrown together with little or no thought. We are trying to have the best cases anyone has ever seen so make sure you keep it tasteful.

The Decorator:

Decorator cases seem to be the favorites of the viewing public, often winning People's Choice awards again and again. These cases feature rocks, but the rocks are a small part of an over all theme bringing in lots of outside elements to create a whole look, much like an professional decorator would do with a room. The rocks become the accents of a larger theme and enhance the total case. Once again look at the case from several angels to make sure it looks good no matter who is looking at it. Make sure you don't make the case too busy and that the rock gets some definition. This can be on the most fun displays to create as you bring in lots of interesting materials and items to create your overall individual look. Look around your house to see what themes or other things you collect then incorporate this into a look with rocks and before you know it you've created your case.

So no matter what type of case you might create from simple to elaborate, have fun, view from all angles, and start planning now, the show will be here before you know it.

For those who have searched for Oregon Sunstones on the Club's claims in the Rabbit Basin: Have you ever wondered what that cluster of trailers off to the east was? The group of trailers is the camp area of Sunstones, Inc. (SI). SI is a corporation, formed in 1991, owned by 35 shareholders, and we have nine sunstone claims to the east of the RAC claims.

The corporation takes care of the administrative tasks associated with the BLM and the mining claims. The corporation also operates and maintains claims for the benefit of the shareholders. Each individual shareholder has the opportunity to prospect and mine for sunstones according to their schedule, on what are essentially their private claims. Mining methods are restricted to hand tools and small power tools so that all shareholders have an equal opportunity to find stones. We do not permit any public or fee digging. However, shareholders may invite guests to come out and dig with them.

The corporation currently maintains three pit areas for access by the shareholders. Our colored stones are generally not as large as found on other claims, but they are usually of high quality and vivid color. Our schiller stones are large and unrivaled for quality. The digging is easy as the corporation generally keeps the pit areas clean. The corporation also usually maintains piles of excavated material that can be screened for those who do not wish, or are unable, to dig in the pits.

Currently, there are several shares available for transfer if anyone is interested in moving up to a more serious sunstone experience. The cost of a share is quite reasonable. If you are interested, or would like more information, please give me a call. Dick Taug, (503)-669-0189.
